

Rector's Letter

Dear Friends

The Peace of Christ

'My Father if it be possible let this cup pass from me; nevertheless not as I will but as you will.' Matthew 26.39.

One of the most shocking events over the summer was the murder of Fr Jacques Hamel, killed with a knife as he said Mass in the church of St Stephen at Saint-Etienne -du-Rouvray in France. It was a wicked act of violence against an innocent 85 year old priest, who was carrying out what he believed to be the most sacred act in his religion. We can only hope and pray that crimes like this can somehow be prevented in the future.

Protestants, of course, regard Holy Communion quite differently from the Mass. For us the emphasis in Communion is more on remembrance than it is on re-enactment, though we do feed in our hearts by faith on Christ. However, we have a holy table not an altar. We offer no sacrifice but remember the once and for all sacrifice of Christ on the cross for our sins. Our priest is not the presiding minister but the Lord Jesus Christ who is present with us by his Spirit. Our sacrament is the Lord's Supper (1 Corinthians 11.20) not the Mass.

Despite these differences it is still extremely disturbing to think that this elderly man was targeted simply because of his religious beliefs and position. Sadly it is a reflection of the dangerous world in which we live.

The stoning to death of Stephen, who gave his name to the town in Normandy, was also brutally violent. Acts chapter 7 recounts how his murderers were enraged at his testimony and 'ground their teeth at him.' Stephen, full of the Holy Spirit, just before his death described how he saw the heavens open and the Son of Man standing at the right hand of God (Acts 7.54-58). Like Stephen, every Christian, at the moment of death, goes to be with the Lord immediately. Stephen is the protomartyr of the church. There have been many others recognised as martyrs over the centuries. St Thomas Becket comes to mind. As Archbishop of Canterbury, he was famously murdered in Canterbury cathedral by knights who were apparently trying to please the king, Henry II.

In more recent times there have been many more martyrs though we rarely hear of them because their deaths occur in parts of the world far away from us in the West. Statistics show that, worldwide, there were more violent deaths on account of the victim's faith in the 20^{th} century than in all the previous nineteen put together.

Jesus himself died a violent death on the cross. He did not court murder but by carrying on his just and truthful life he became the victim of evil men. He went willingly to Calvary knowing that he would be laying down his innocent life for the sake of others. There was no other way to open the gate of heaven. His death was unique. He suffered physically and spiritually in a way that no other martyr has, bearing the punishment for the sins of the world. As we trust in his death we find peace with God.


BOOK REVIEW

J.C. Ryle, Prepared to Stand Alone by Iain Murray and published by Banner of Truth Trust.

The life of bishop J.C. Ryle has only to be heard once to be remembered. His 84 years (1816–1900) included remarkable contrasts—the promise of a fortune, then the poverty of a bankrupt; a Suffolk country pastor, then bishop of the leading seaport of the British

Empire. But there was a still greater change—from the successful youth at Eton and Oxford, who did not pray or read his Bible till he was 21, to become a Christian 'bold as a lion for the truth of God's Word and his Gospel'.

Although one of the most widely read evangelical authors of the nineteenth century, Ryle's writings lost influence after his death. The world had moved on, as was supposed. Then, fifty years later a 'rediscovery' began. Research on his life was accomplished by able authors, and from a new wealth of material lain Murray has put together a compelling biography. Ryle believed in definite doctrine, in a message which



does not adjust to the times, in revival, and in the living Christ. He knew that all the great turning points of church history have been attended with controversy, and that 'there are times when controversy is not only a duty but a benefit'.

J.C. Ryle's life is convincing evidence that Christianity stands or falls depending on its relation to the word of God and to the Holy Spirit. That he is being read widely again at the present time gives hope of better days.

MEN'S BREAKFAST (Annual Report 2015-16)

The men of Knockbreda Parish, SRPC and others have been privileged to share Christian fellowship and to hear from many interesting speakers throughout the year.

In September our own Brian Monson gave us an insight into two challenging journeys; living with cancer and a troublesome sailing trip from Falmouth to Killyleagh. In both cases Brian was aware of the immense power of prayer. Being surrounded with healing prayer during his illness (Jesus still heals today!) and living in the presence of God in 'stormy seas' deepened his faith. In Mark Ch11 v24 Jesus tells us to pray in faith '... whatever you ask for in prayer, believe that you have received it, and it will be yours'. In October with the rugby world cup in mind we had a rugby themed breakfast taking the form of a DVD presentation entitled 'Game of Life'. The DVD covered the origins of the game, its worldwide impact and a light hearted guiz. Most importantly the DVD included personal testimonies from well-known players. It was clear that their love for rugby was secondary to their love for God who was at the centre of all in their lives. In November, at the start of our weeklong mission, Revd Trevor Johnston spoke of the important role men must play in responding to God's call to be witnesses for the Faith. In January David Luckman, Crosslinks, continued this theme. David told us of his lack of interest during his early church life and as a member of the BB. At 15, whilst at RBAI, having received a tract from a teacher, he gave his life to the Lord and received Salvation. David referred to Ephesians Ch2 vs8-9 which tells us 'For it is by grace you have been saved, through faith ...not by works'. Verse 10 goes on to say that we are 'created in Christ Jesus to do good works, which God prepared in advance for us to do.' David told us that for Christian men saving 'no' to the Lord wasn't an option! In February, Mark Collier (Friends in Action) and Mark Gibson (Serving In Mission) gave us an introduction into their work in Burkina Faso with the Fulani, a semi-nomadic people. Their work aims to demonstrate the love of Christ by drilling water wells and telling the mostly Muslim people of Jesus' offer of life changing spiritual water. In this area it costs the equivalent of 10p to see a doctor - most people cannot afford this small amount! Their talk also touched on the recent killing of a close friend, Mike Riddering, in an Al Qaeda attack on a coffee bar frequently used by missionaries. In March, Revd Gerardo Gimpel gave us an insight into his upbringing and how he found true faith in an Anglican setting. Working with SAMS would lead to service in Co Tyrone, study back in Chile followed by an arduous period serving in a Chilean desert. A return to N Ireland as Pastoral Assistant at Knockbreda was followed by ordination in Chile and a return to Knockbreda as Curate Assistant. Gerardo has been greatly comforted by God's promise in Jeremiah Ch29 v11. In April, propped up by a Tom Maguire feast, a sizeable contingent paid a visit to the Kingspan Stadium, the home of Ulster Rugby. The Nevin Spence visitor centre is well worth a visit. Many thanks go to the Rector for his much appreciated support throughout the year, to Tom Maguire as head chef and to Tom Davies for his leadership.

What you have in common with Kate Middleton?

Imagine trying to visit the Queen of England at Buckingham Palace in London. You're going to be asked, "Who are you? What gives you the right to be here?" Most of us aren't going to get past the front gate. But what about Kate Middleton? When she was 15 years old, she would have gone no further than we could. But now she can say, "I'm with him. I married the prince." Who is she now? She is Her Royal Highness The Duchess of Cambridge. She gets that identity from her

In the same way, Christians get their identity from Jesus their Husband. United to the Son, they're now family.

In the book of Exodus God describes Israel as his "firstborn son" (Ex. 4.22). In the New Testament, he gives that same assurance to those who receive him through Jesus: "To those who believed in his name, he gave the right to become children of God" (John 1.12).

So, who am I now? Answer: One of God's royal children. A person defined by him. You may have just been a great employee, or you may have had a terrible day at work. You may have been a great parent or child, or a selfish one. You may have been praised, or mocked, or ignored. You may have been mainly obedient to God or horribly sinful. But if you have embraced Christ as your Lord and Saviour, then you are a child of the King—and nothing can change that identity. Today you can go out with confidence—not in what you can do, but in who is with you. And one day you will be welcomed into the heavenly palace because your identity is found in Jesus.

Who am I? As a Christian, I am a child of God. And today God speaks these wonderful words to you: "I am with you."

KNOCKBREDA BADMINTON CLUB – 1937 to 2017

The 2016/17 season will mark more than 80 years of badminton at Knockbreda. The late Ernest Wood's book "Set on a Hill", which charts the life of Knockbreda Parish from its beginnings in 1737 up to and including 1987, records that our first Parochial Hall (now a residence in the Council Cemetery) was built in 1930. He further goes on to record that "..... Young people keen to play badminton found the new precinct allowed a court with space at side and rear, though the cross beams at ceiling height were somewhat of a hazard! ...". 1937 is the first formal record we have with the accounts showing 'cash to begin' at £3 - 0s - 5d. The Editor and the printers have done an excellent job in reproducing an extract from those accounts

Badminton continued through the war years but not without its hazards as noted in this extract from the minutes. "The adjourned AGM of the Badminton Club was held in the Parochial Hall on Wednesday 26th November 1941 at 8.00pm. Mr. W. Brown was Chairman. The Secretary reported that owing to enemy action the Minute Book had been destroyed, therefore the minutes of the last meeting could not be read.". That meeting went on to decide to arrange a dance in aid of club funds on New Years Eve in the parochial hall. "A meeting of the Committee was held on 28th December 1941. It was agreed that minerals should be the only refreshment provided. Mr. Brown stated he had cigarettes for prizes and Miss A. England offered a prize also. It was agreed that the gentlemen members should take half-hourly turns lifting the money at the door. Mr. Busby was requested to look after the Programme.".

The minutes of the early years AGMs record a thriving active club participating in the Northern Branch (later to become the Ulster Branch) of the Badminton Union of Ireland. Play was initially on a Saturday but by the early 1950s the Select Vestry gave permission for use of the hall on Wednesday evenings. By 1950 the club had A and B teams and it had joined the Churches League. In April 1952 the Match Secretary reported that the A Team had come 2nd in the Church of Ireland League – Junior Section. Between 1954 and 1957 the club ran a very successful inter-towns match between Belfast and Dublin composed mainly of international players with the minutes recording that "...the 1956 Exhibition Match was the best ever.".

In 1959 a Junior Club was formed with 28 members which met on Saturday afternoons and the early part of Wednesday evenings. The minutes of the April 1960 AGM records "... The Junior Club had a



successful launching and the first fruits would be plucked in the 1960/61 season when several boys would make their début in the senior club.". The Juniors was a very happy club and produced many fine players two of whom play in the current senior club. The Junior Club closed in 1998 mainly because of the difficulty in getting adult supervision compliant with the Safeguarding Trust policy.

The 1960s proved successful for both the A & B teams with the A Team winning the Junior League Championship in 1966 and in 1969 the B Team having double success in winning the Minor Shield and the Minor Cup of the Church of Ireland League. 1970 saw the opening of what was then described as the 'New Church Hall' and the excellent badminton facility in the main hall with one of the highest ceilings on the badminton circuit.

Success continued in the 1970s (too many to list!) with the A Team entering the North Down League in 1975 and year on year gaining promotion. Leaping forward to 1985 the A & B teams won their respective divisions of the North Down League and were also playing in the Church of Ireland League and the Ulster League and therein lay the seeds of destruction. Too late it was recognised it had become a 'team club' with club nights being taken over for league/ cup matches and players on the fringes of teams not getting playing enough badminton and club membership diminished. Because there were not the players to cope with cry-offs matches were cancelled and the club started to withdraw from leagues. In 1991 the club closed

In 1992 the club was reconstituted and many of the former members came back and it is that club, God willing, that sets out on the 2016/17 season on Wednesday 14 September at 8.00pm in the Main Hall. It is, I think, idle to speculate on how many more years the club will have but if you want to be

part of this element of the Knockbreda story you are

more than welcome to come along.
